The English department would like to commend all the KS3 students who have put lots of effort into their Sparx reader homework this year.

This year, Crispin students have read 36,121,137 words in total, with 5064 hours of careful reading completed.

The Sparx programme helps every student to achieve regular independent reading, which is incredibly important for building vital literacy skills. The priority of the reading programme is not reading for pleasure, but careful reading to build and develop accurate reading comprehension skills. We hope that students will be encouraged to continue to read for pleasure at home, in addition to the 30 minutes of reading comprehension homework. This will continue next school year for all KS3 students.

Thanks to parents and carers for reminding students to complete their Sparx homework and also for encouraging reading generally, all of which really helps students to become more fluent and confident readers.


2025-26 Review

Theatre Trips

Students have had the opportunity to attend a number of theatre trips this year.

In January we were invited to see 'Ministry of Memory' at SPACE performed by their Year 2 students, this verbatim performance was an emotive

piece of theatre that explored the impact of core moments in our lives that shape who are as humans.

Our year 11s ventured to London to see Stranger Things: First Shadow which is a prequal to the Netflix series. The students and staff were blown away by the impressive special effects and creative design and only jumped a little at the scary bits!!

Another trip to this show is planned for our GCSE students in the Autumn term of next year.

Most recently we visited Bristol with year 9 &10 GCSE drama students to see National Theatre's War Horse.



Our trip to see War Horse was a powerful experience. Students were really impressed by the lifelike puppetry, and the story had a strong emotional impact – there were definitely a few tears, staff and students too. It's one of those shows that everyone should see at least once.

SPACE Dance Workshop

A select group of students were invited to participate in a dance workshop run by James Northover from Somerset Performing Arts Centre for Education (SPACE).

The workshop was inspired by the company's recent performance of Monument to Childhood, which featured a range of dance styles including Contemporary, Ballet, Tap and Commercial. The show explored common childhood experiences—such as skipping, playground games and friendship struggles—and turned them into a powerful piece of dance theatre.



During the workshop, students learned two contrasting pieces from the show: one was an emotive Contemporary piece about bullying and exclusion, while the other was a lively routine inspired by children's clapping games. Our students were a credit to themselves and the school, producing some truly thoughtful and creative work.

We're excited to announce that our school production of Frozen Jr. will be hitting the stage at Strode Theatre from 5th-7th February 2026! Auditions have already taken place, and the cast list will be announced soon. We can't wait to reveal the fantastic talent bringing Arendelle to life.
