Attendance & Safeguarding

Regular attendance is about more than just learning - it is also a key part of safeguarding. Unexplained or persistent absence can sometimes indicate that a child is facing difficulties at home or in school. For this reason, we monitor attendance carefully and work with families to ensure students are present and engaged.

Our expectation is that every student maintains 96% or higher attendance. We know that children with good attendance achieve better academically, develop stronger friendships, and feel more connected to school life.

If your child is struggling to attend, please talk to us as soon as possible. Together, we can identify barriers - whether health, anxiety, or practical challenges - and put support in place. By working in partnership, we can help all children succeed.

Road Safety Talks

On Monday, 10th November, Somerset Road Safety delivered a presentation led by an ex-police officer with over 30 years of experience, aimed at raising students' awareness of everyday risks on and near the road.

Using real-life examples and video clips, pupils learned about the importance of wearing seatbelts, removing headphones when crossing roads, and making safe decisions as passengers.

The session strongly supported our statutory PSHE "Curriculum for Life" programme, helping pupils develop informed, responsible behaviours that promote their personal safety and could ultimately prevent serious injury or save a life.

Show Racism the Red Card - A Week of Awareness and Unity

Crispin School came together in a powerful display of unity to support *Show Racism the Red Card*.

Every lesson across the week began with a themed Do Now exploring kindness, discrimination, and equality, sparking meaningful conversations among pupils.

Assemblies throughout the week deepened understanding of racism as a form of bullying and the importance of standing up for others.

The week culminated in a sea of red on Friday, as pupils and staff proudly wore red to show their commitment to tackling racism and promoting inclusion.

At lunchtime, the atmosphere was electric with stickers and posters held high, and the sound of music of Black origin creating a vibrant celebration of diversity, respect, and community spirit.

It was a week that truly embodied our *Thrive* values of respect, empathy, and action.

Upcoming Assemblies & Workshops

Supporting Respect, Safety & Personal Development

As part of our ongoing work to educate and safeguard our students, we are pleased to share details of two important assemblies and workshops taking place this term and next, delivered in partnership with Collaborative Digital, a specialist organisation that works nationally with schools on issues affecting young people today.

These sessions have been carefully planned to complement and strengthen the curriculum taught through Curriculum for Life, with a particular focus on respect, relationships, community safety and personal responsibility. Content will be age-appropriate, factual, and supported by current statistics and real-world examples to help students understand the relevance of these topics in their own lives.

VAWG (Violence Against Women and Girls) Friday 12th December 2025

Students will take part in an assembly and workshop exploring:

- What VAWG means in the context of young people
- Everyday behaviours that impact the safety and wellbeing of girls and young women
- The difference between anti-social behaviours and criminal offences
- How harmful online content (such as "manosphere" messaging) influences attitudes
- The importance of positive male role models and challenging misogyny
- How boys and young men can be allies
- Support available both in and outside school
 The aim is not to alarm, but to educate, empower and raise awareness so that all students develop respect, empathy and understanding of how their words and actions affect others

Anti-Social Behaviour & Active Bystanding Monday 12th January 2026

This assembly and workshop will cover:

- What anti-social behaviour looks like for young people
- How online conflicts and "beef" can escalate into realworld aggression
- Recognising early signs that someone may be at risk
- Harassment of women and girls
- What it means to be an active bystander (safe ways to intervene, support or report)
- The difference between "snitching" and responsible reporting
- Joint enterprise and the legal consequences of being involved in group violence
- Where students can access help and support

These sessions will help students understand the challenges many young people face today and equip them with the knowledge and confidence to make positive, safe choices. A Safe, Respectful and Supportive School Community.

Both sessions are designed to:

- Build on the ongoing learning students receive in Curriculum for Life
- Provide evidence-based, fact-driven information
- Encourage respectful discussion
- Promote a culture where students feel safe and feel able to speak up
- Strengthen our whole-school safeguarding approach

Inspiring Visit to the Redbrick Building Coffee Morning

On Friday 28 November, a group of ten Year 8 students had the privilege of attending a Community Coffee Morning at the historic Redbrick Building in Glastonbury, formerly the Morlands Factory. The visit formed part of the History department's wider work on the British Empire, the Industrial Revolution and the school's Thrive initiative, and it offered students a unique chance to bring their classroom learning to life.

During the morning, students interviewed former Morlands employees, gathering fascinating firsthand accounts of factory life and the roles their families held across different generations. These conversations provided invaluable insight into the local area's industrial heritage and helped students deepen their understanding of how national historical developments shaped the community around them.

A highlight of the visit was an unexpected opportunity to tour the GWS Radio studio, located within the building. Students were able to observe a live broadcasting environment, learn about the history of the radio station and even ask questions about how shows are produced and presented.

The visit was a tremendous success, with students fully engaging in their interviews and showing great curiosity throughout. Staff reported that the group gained an enormous amount of educational benefit from the experience, returning to school with new knowledge, inspiration and plenty of stories to share.

Past and present Crispin students came together in a Careers Talk & Demo focused on Barbering skills and pathways. We welcomed back Licio and Nik whose journey from Crispin to Strode College started in September where they are pursuing a Level 2 NVQ Diploma in Barbering. Under the watchful eyes of tutor Paul Brookes a small group watched Licio demo his skills and heard about their experiences so far. Paul gave insight into the course, training options, potential income, and where a career in barbering can lead. Nik and Licio's developing confidence rubbed off on some of our year 10 students who have been inspired to seek barbering work experience placements.


