Message from Mr Bullock - Acting Deputy Headteacher

It is hard to believe that I am writing this as we approach what is already the end of the second week of 2026. It has been a real pleasure to see the continuation of the focus and positive attitude of our students across the school which Mr Cornwall alluded to in his message last week. Within our school there is an undeniable and tangible sense of momentum building, and it is clear that students are determined to make the most of the opportunities ahead.

This term is an especially important one for our Year 11 students, with just 13 weeks now remaining until the start of their GCSE examinations. This is the point at which effective revision really needs to begin in earnest. I would strongly encourage all Year 11 students to engage fully with our extensive UpGrade offer, which runs both after school and at lunchtime. Timetables are shared on our social media platforms and displayed on screens around the school. The time invested now will pay dividends later – you will not regret the hours you put in, but you may regret those you do not.

In the coming weeks, we will also be hosting a Revision Skills Workshop for parents and carers, designed to provide practical guidance on how best to support students in the lead-up to the February PPEs and those all-important summer examinations.

These assessments will take place in the weeks that straddle the February half-term break, deliberately mirroring the structure of the summer exam period.


This approach helps students build stamina and develop the resilience needed to stay motivated both before and after a week break "off".

THRIVE & Careers Youth Work Assembly

Years 7 and 8 recently enjoyed an assembly put together by our local YMCA Youth Club Team Leader, Jess Lewin.

Students learned about youth work – Jess comes into Crispin regularly and runs a lunch club and 1-to-1 mentoring sessions. In tutor time follow up conversations looked at salaries for youth work, required skills or qualifications and gave students chance to reflect on whether this might be a future pathway for them!



Talking Futures is a website to help parents and carers talk to their children and young people talk about

options after school. It can open up conversations early and help explore ideas when thinking about those big decisions. An important part of gaining experience and confidence in a mix of workplaces throughout a student's school career is work experience.

The **Equalex Framework** for work experience, which sets out an ambitious and modern approach for all students to gain at least one week of work experience activities in Years 7-9 and at least one week of placements in Years 10-11. This helps them make informed choices, broadens skills, and enables them to feel career ready. Crispin Careers Team will update parents and look to run in-person sessions as we learn more in 2026.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

As part of our ongoing commitment to promoting equality, celebrating diversity, and ensuring an inclusive school community, we have been taking part in a 'Show Racism the Red Card' campaign this month. This campaign uses **Football as a Platform** to educate and raise awareness about racism through influential role models.

Key Campaign Messages teach that racism is learned, silence perpetuates it, and everyone can challenge it actively. Our focus has been to engage the students in our school to promote respect, inclusion, and anti-discrimination.

To show our collective support, we held a non-uniform day, inviting all students and staff to **wear something red** as a visible statement of unity and our shared commitment to challenging racism in all its forms. There was music and photographs in the school hall at lunchtime, offering students and staff the opportunity to come together to show their allyship for anti-racism in our school community, and we had a great turnout!

We kindly ask for your support in continuing these important conversations at home. Talking with your child about respect, inclusion, and the value of diversity helps reinforce the strong message we aim to embed in school, namely, that racism has no place in our community, and we uphold a zero-tolerance approach to discriminatory behaviour.



Wellbeing and Pastoral Care

Our community continues to be incredibly important to us, and one of the most important parts of that community is hearing our student voice and the voice of our parents. We recently conducted a student survey which covered many topics from whether students feel safe in school, to their involvement within our enrichment program and their thoughts on their extended learning.

We are pleased to provide feedback that 87% of our students reported feeling safe in school and that 92% of our students were able to identify staff they could go to if they had a problem. 87% of our students also told us that they felt like they belonged at Crispin School. Students also gave us feedback on improvement of the rewards program and we are delighted to announce that there are some new rewards coming soon..

UCS College Group Somerset are also on a mission to inspire young people with confidence, skills and key connections to land the apprenticeship or role they really want.




