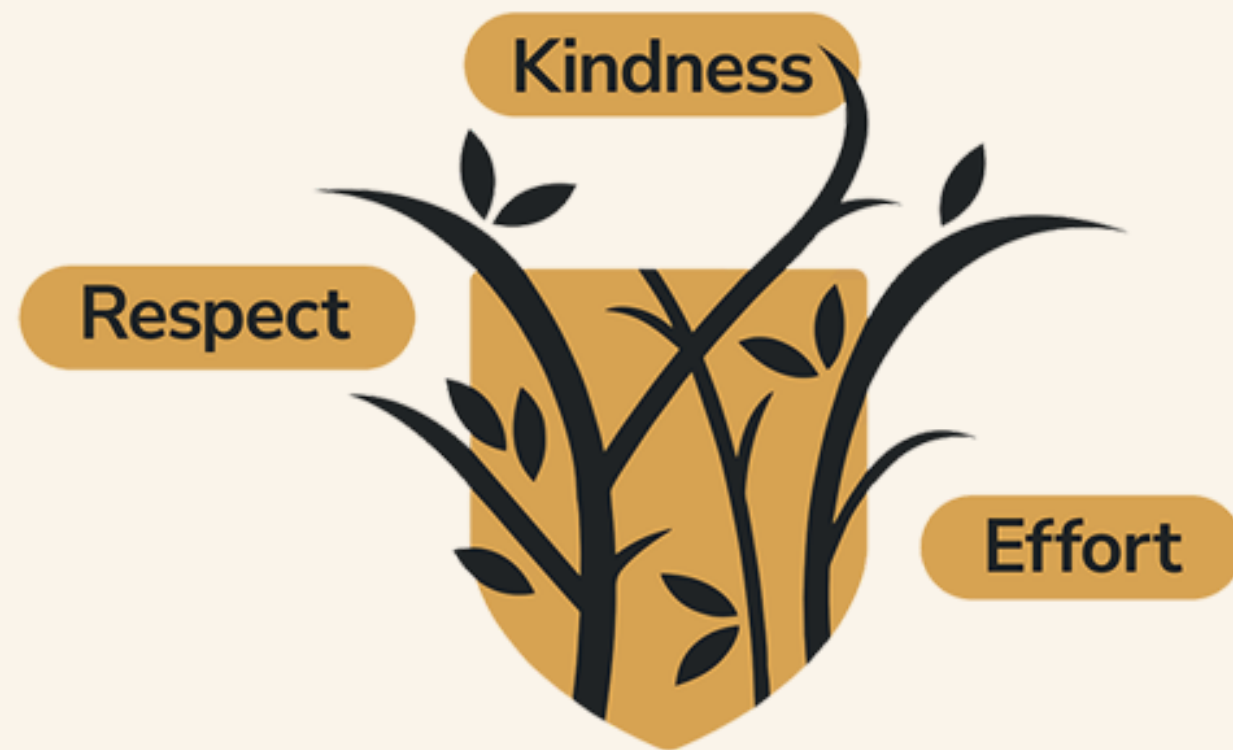

School Uniform

At Crispin, we take pride in our uniform as it helps to create a sense of belonging and community. All students are expected to wear the correct uniform each day and present themselves in a neat and appropriate manner.

Please note that only certain items of our uniform are required to be branded and purchased from the South West School Shop. These items include the school jumper, PE kit, and school tie.

All other items, such as trousers, skirts, shirts, and shoes do not need to be branded and can be purchased from any supermarket or retail shop, provided they meet the expectations outlined in our uniform policy.

Full details of our uniform requirements can be found in our uniform policy, available on the school website or from the main office.

We understand that purchasing school uniform can sometimes place a financial strain on families. Support with uniform costs is available for students eligible for Pupil Premium. If you are in need of this assistance then please contact our Pupil Premium Learning Mentor, who will be happy to offer guidance and support. All enquiries will be treated with sensitivity and confidentiality.

PE Kit

All students are expected to arrive to PE correctly wearing their normal school uniforms.

Students are then expected to change for PE lessons into the correct kit. The acceptable PE kit is as follows:

- Plain black shorts, black skort or black tracksuit bottoms (leggings and tights will not be permitted for PE)
- A black Crispin School labelled PE round neck sports t-shirt
- A black Crispin School labelled PE jumper. (please note that hoodies and coats are not permitted)
- Black base layers (e.g. under armour) are acceptable for added warmth
- Suitable sports trainers and, where required, plastic studded boots for the astro and field (school shoes or casual trainers are not permitted)
- Black long socks for the outdoors and white short socks for indoors
- Shin pads for football and hockey. These can be purchased for £5-10 online
- Gumshields for rugby and hockey. These can also be purchased for £5-10 online or alternatively we the PE department can supply one for £3
- A drinks bottle
- No jewellery allowed including earrings or watches
- No aerosol deodorant usage in the changing rooms
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It is important that all items are clearly labelled with your child's name. Students who do not bring the correct kit will be expected to wear the clean spare PE kit provided. Persistent issues with kit will result in further communication with parents or carers to ensure appropriate support is in place. Students may also be required to attend lunchtime or after school detentions for persistent failure to bring their PE kit.

If your child has a PE lesson during period 5, they are allowed to leave the school wearing their PE kit if they so choose. For all other times of the day, students are expected to change back into their school uniforms.

Your First Day

On your first day you will enter school through the main student entrance and head to the hall. Crispin colleagues will be waiting to greet you outside the building if you need help. From there we will direct you towards the main hall where we will have an initial assembly before moving you into your tutor groups.

You will need a pencil case, your uniform and a packed lunch and a drink.

You will **not** need your PE kit on the first day.

During the first week we will be spending time helping you feel at home and comfortable at Crispin. You will spend time getting to know new students, meeting staff and students in your tutor group and familiarising yourself with the site, and the schools expectations.

When lessons begin, Year 7s will be allowed to leave 5 minutes before the end of each lesson for the first two weeks whilst they get used to finding different rooms around school.

Year 7 lunch will be 10 minutes earlier than it normally would be (from 13:20 each day) for the first two weeks in September.

Getting to School and School Timings

The majority of our students live within walking distance to the school and have the advantage of being able to walk to school.

If students cycle or scoot to school, they must lock their bicycle/scooter in the cycle area. This area is locked at 08:35 and unlocked at the end of school at 15:10.

If students are to be dropped off via car, we ask that you use the roads close to the school rather than immediately outside of the school as this causes congestion and can place students in additional danger.

Buses

Many students come to school on one of Somerset Council's bus routes. If you travel by bus, you will be provided with a bus pass with your name and route. These are issued via the school Reception within the first few weeks of term. Please keep these safe as these will be checked. If lost, replacements will need to be purchased. Your bus place will be confirmed in writing by Somerset Council. You must travel on your assigned route only, you cannot take friends on the buses with you who have no pass. The School buses depart from Crispin at 15:30

School Day

The school day starts at 08:35 and we expect students to be on site at 08:30 so they are ready for the day. The school Reception opens at 08:00. We run a two week timetable rotation of 50 lessons, each an hour long.

Timetable

There are also after school clubs, homework club and enrichment activities for you to take part in.

Your Timetable

You will be issued with a timetable on your first day. It is vital you look after this, so you know where you are going each day.

Equipment

Please ensure that you arrive to school every day equipped to learn. You should check your timetable each day so that you have the relevant class books, PE kit, ingredients (if needed for cooking), etc.

You will also need the following in a labelled pencil case and bag every day.

- Pencils (at least 2)
- Blue or black pen (at least 3) – students are expected to write in ink,
- Ruler – 15cm
- Rubber
- Scissors
- Purple pen (at least 2) – for corrections and improvements in your work.
- Glue stick
- Highlighters
- Casio Calculator fx-83GT CW Entry level scientific calculator.

Many of these items are available to buy from the school shop which is open Monday and Wednesday at lunchtimes for students.

Personal Belongings

Please ensure all your personal belongings are clearly labelled.

Any expensive items are brought to school at your own risk. It is advisable to hand valuables in to staff during PE lessons.

Lost Property – we have a lost property box which is based in Reception.

Communications

We will communicate with you by sending letters home via email, by posting on the school website and by using our social media accounts ie Facebook and Instagram to keep parents/carers updated with our latest news and important information.

Please note that all staff have up to 48 hours to respond to any parent/carers enquiries.

How to download?

Search for 'Bromcom student app' in your app store and download and install the Bromcom Student App.

How to login?

Open the app and select 'Microsoft'. Select 'Continue' on the pop up box and enter your school email address and password. Set your PIN number. This will be used for future logins so please keep it safe.

When it will be available?

Students will be able to use the app once their school email address and password has been set up, this is normally done in the first week of students' starting at Crispin.

What students can use it for?

Attendance, Subjects, Timetable, Homework (we are currently using Teams for this), Behaviour, Exam Timetables, Lesson Plans, Calendar Events, Clubs, Detentions and Documents.

How to download

How to get your login password

You will receive a welcome email from Bromcom with instructions on how to create a password for your MCAS account. Email office@crispinschool.co.uk if you haven't received this email.

Once set up, this will be the password that you use on the MCAS App or website. **www.mychildatschool.com**

The email address will be the same address that the welcome email went to.

Your Tutor

Tutor - Your tutor is your **primary contact** for personal matters as they see you every day of the week.

Parents/carers should liaise with your tutor as and when necessary. **They can do this by calling 01458 442714 or emailing the school office, office@crispinschool.co.uk**

Your tutor will support, guide and monitor you in your academic progress throughout your time at Crispin.

Tutor Programme

Tutor groups have 25 minutes with their tutor four mornings a week and one year assembly in the main school hall. Tutor time is used for daily monitoring by your tutor as well as delivering the tutor programme, reviewing reports, planning for house competitions, sharing successes and reading.

House Information & Rewards System

Lessons are taught in year groups and pastoral care is delivered within tutor groups. Students also belong to one of our four Houses – **Corvus**, **Falco**, **Sturnus** and **Tyto**.



The **Head of Year** is responsible for monitoring attendance, achievement, progress and behaviour within the house tutor groups.

The House system sits as the corner stone of the school's charitable work, sense of community spirit and competition. Each house competes each year to become the 'House Cup' winner.

House Competitions

House competitions take place during tutor time and are spread throughout each term. These competitions vary from the Crispin weekly challenge to month long reading challenges.

Your participation in competitions is rewarded through house points. Our students really look forward to joining in and representing their house in a bid to be the winning house at the end of the year.

House points are also given for demonstrating good manners, good leadership skills and kindness around the school site.

Year 7 Curriculum

We seek to ensure that the Crispin Curriculum is coherent, inclusive and challenging and that it allows you to maximise your learning in the fullest sense by deepening knowledge and understanding, broadening perspectives and ensuring strong student outcomes.

The curriculum will serve to ensure that you leave Crispin as knowledgeable, inquisitive and compassionate citizens.

Finally, enrichment is seen as being a very important part of the Crispin Curriculum and you will have a wide range of opportunities to learn outside formal lessons. Such opportunities include school trips, sporting activities, music, dramatic productions, work experience, visiting speakers and school leadership opportunities.

Celebrating Achievement

Achievement and positive attitude to learning is celebrated on a regular basis and in a number of ways.

Some of the ways to win House points are:

- 100% Attendance.
- Stars of the week which are celebrated in weekly year group assemblies.
- Termly subject specific awards, where parents are invited to school.
- Postcards home.
- Phone calls home.
- Excellent behaviour and attitudes to learning within the classroom
- Going above and beyond both in and outside of the classroom environment

House points are reported home through Bromcom. As the academic year progresses you can earn House point milestones. These milestones are awarded through Bromcom and parents / carers will receive notifications when their child has reached them.

Three times a year Crispin holds a Golden Ticket fortnight, where members of staff recognise students who are showing excellent behaviour and attitudes within the Voice of Crispin. The objective of this fortnight is for students to collect as many Golden Tickets as possible to ensure they have the greatest chance of winning a prize in the end of term draws.

At the end of each term there is a Celebration Assembly morning where subject teachers nominate students from every year group to receive a subject award. This event is open to parents / carers to attend and join in the celebration.

Mobile Phones

We recognise that a large number of parent/carers provide mobile devices to their children to enable them to be safe to and from school. At Crispin we understand the importance of protecting your learning.

There are no circumstances when your mobile phone should be seen on the school site unless explicit permission has been given.

Use of mobile phones is strictly forbidden in lessons and around the school site without explicit direction from a member of staff.

Mobile phones which are brought into school, must be switched off and placed out of sight. If a child brings a mobile phone into school, it is at their own risk.

Whether in or out of school, mobile phones should not be used to make calls, texts or use the camera / video in an inappropriate manner.

Mobile phones should not be used to cause a nuisance in the local community, e.g. playing of audio, video, conversations on loudspeaker on public transportation.

SEND

As your child embarks on this exciting journey, we understand that you may have questions and concerns.

Here are some tips to support your child's transition and ensure a successful start:

- **Stay Informed:** Familiarise yourself with the support services available for students with SEND at Crispin School. Our dedicated team is here to assist you.
- **Open Communication:** Maintain open communication with school staff, including the SEND team and teachers. Share any concerns or information about your child's needs to ensure they receive the appropriate support.
- **Prepare Together:** Involve your child in the transition process by discussing expectations, routines, and any anxieties they may have. Encourage them to ask questions and express their feelings about starting secondary school.
- **Encourage Independence:** Help your child develop independence skills, such as organising their belongings, managing time, and advocating for themselves. These skills will empower them to navigate the challenges of secondary school.
- **Promote Self-Care:** Emphasize the importance of self-care and emotional wellbeing. Encourage your child to engage in activities they enjoy, maintain a balanced lifestyle, and seek support when needed.
- **Get Involved:** Take advantage of opportunities to get involved in the school community, such as attending parent meetings, volunteering, and participating in school events. Your active participation strengthens our partnership and supports your child's educational journey.

Extended Learning

Extended learning provides additional opportunities for students to learn and progress outside the classroom. You could be expected to complete a written, research or learning task for example.

You will rarely be expected to complete extended learning for the next day and are encouraged to speak to your teachers if you need support in advance of the deadline as well as completing extended learning when absent.

Why is it important?

- It gives you the opportunity to learn new things and extend your skills
- Offers the opportunity to practice learning methods to find what suits you
- Prepares Lower School students for Year 10 & Year 11 where revision is expected
- Develops Upper School students where GCSE curricula requires work outside of the classroom

Thrive

There are a wide variety of clubs on offer during lunchtimes and after school which will be publicised during the first week of each term.

You can attend any club for your year group, but you must arrange transport home with your parents / carers if you are staying after school.

Notices are put on our social media channels and on Teams if there are any changes or cancellations to any clubs.

If you need to contact parents/carers due to changes to commitments, you may use the phone at Reception.

Attendance

Your personal attendance target is 96%.

If you are absent from school your parent/carer must report your absence with a reason by 08:55 via the MyChildAtSchool website or app. If we receive no reason for absence, this will be unauthorised.

If you need to leave school during the school day to attend an appointment, you need to provide school with a signed, dated appointment card. This should be presented to the Attendance Officer at Student Reception when you need to leave school.

Further information in relation to attendance matters can be found in our Attendance leaflet on our school website and enclosed in this pack. Attendance is monitored closely and where needed, letters are sent home and interventions put in place.

We know that moving to secondary school is a big step, and establishing positive routines early on makes a real difference.

We also understand that sometimes there may be challenges that make attending school difficult. If this happens, please know that you are not alone. We are here to work in partnership with families to understand any concerns and find supportive solutions together. Whether it's worries about settling in, health needs, or other circumstances, our pastoral team is ready to listen and help.

Our aim is to create a culture where every child feels safe, supported, and ready to attend each day. By working together, we can ensure your child has the best possible start to their secondary school journey. Absences/Appointments

The main method to report all absence related matters is via the MyChildAtSchool website or app.

If you need to leave school during the school day to attend an appointment, notice of this should also be sent in via the MyChildAtSchool app. You need to provide school with a signed, dated appointment card. This should be presented to the Attendance Officer at Reception when you need to leave school.

Lateness

If you are late, you should go to Reception and sign in. If you are late for registration, you will be required to attend a 15 minute detention held at break time. If you fail to attend this detention it will be escalated to a 20 minute lunch time detention the next day.

Lifts

The Tower Block lift is strictly out of bounds other than to individuals who have been granted permission to use them. Lift passes are authorised by the Head of Year.

Litter

Litter should be disposed of correctly using the bins and recycling facilities provided around the school grounds.

Food and drink

You can purchase food and drinks from the school canteen at break and lunchtime or bring in a packed lunch.

School Canteen

The Canteen operates a 'cashless catering' system that eliminates the need for students to carry cash with them to school. It is a biometric system that enables parents/carers to pay money into their child's ParentPay meal account. Students use their finger/thumb print in order to pay from their account.

What is a biometric system and how can I register my child? The system uses a person's unique thumbprint to authorise payment for food and drink purchased from the canteen facilities.

Money spent on food or drink is deducted on a daily basis. With an online payment account, parents can monitor what their children are buying for lunch. We ask that parents/carers ensure accounts are topped up. We currently use www.ParentPay.com for the cashless catering service, you will be sent through an activation code to be able to add funds to the account. We will be changing this in the coming months, which will be communicated with you.

Water fountains are available around school for refilling drinks bottles at break or lunchtime.

Water bottles only are allowed in class but not in any Science laboratories or computer rooms. Fizzy/energy drinks are not permitted on the school site.

Reports

Academic Progress Reports are produced three times a year, reflecting your approach to learning and subject assessment descriptors.

You will regularly review and set targets for yourself through our Academic Mentoring Programme which is led by your tutor.

Progress Reports are emailed home to parents / carers and they are accessed via an emailed link.

How is the pupil premium funding used?

This funding can be used in a variety of ways to support students throughout the academic year. This includes assistance with the cost of school uniform, including essential branded items where required.

Pupil Premium support may also contribute towards the cost of curriculum trips and visits, ensuring that all students are able to take part in valuable learning experiences outside the classroom.

How can I ensure the school gets the funding?

The more eligible pupils that are registered for free school meals, the more funding the school receives. Registering does not mean your child has to take up free school meals if they don't want to. You should still register for free school meals even if you would rather your child had a different meal, such as a packed lunch. Service Pupil Premium funding primarily supports the pastoral needs of students when or if needed. It does not support uniform, visits etc.

Free School Meals

WHICH STUDENTS QUALIFY FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

Students may be eligible for free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF CLAIMING FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

School meals are a good way to ensure that your child eats well at lunchtime and they can also save you time and money. Claiming free school meals also helps the school. We get extra funding, known as 'Pupil Premium', to support the education of every eligible pupil who is registered.

- Flu vaccinations – Reception to Year '11



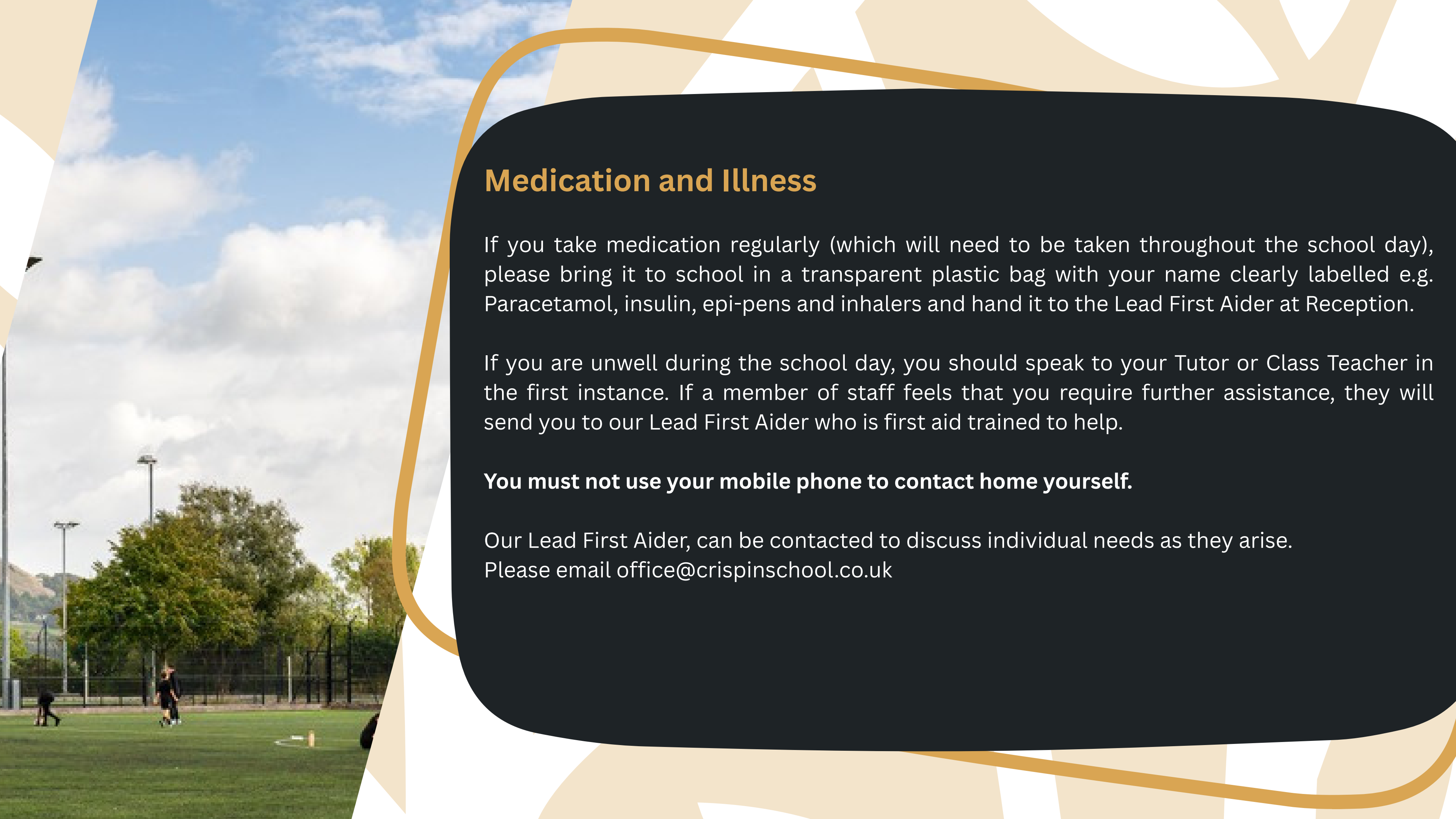

Medication and Illness

If you take medication regularly (which will need to be taken throughout the school day), please bring it to school in a transparent plastic bag with your name clearly labelled e.g. Paracetamol, insulin, epi-pens and inhalers and hand it to the Lead First Aider at Reception.

If you are unwell during the school day, you should speak to your Tutor or Class Teacher in the first instance. If a member of staff feels that you require further assistance, they will send you to our Lead First Aider who is first aid trained to help.

You must not use your mobile phone to contact home yourself.

Instrumental and Vocal Tuition at Crispin School

Crispin offers instrumental lessons to all students. Most instruments are offered through private instrumental teachers. Lessons are delivered to students during the school day on a rotating timetable to ensure that the same academic lesson is not missed regularly.

Lessons can be booked as a 20-minute or 30-minute lesson.
